

# Cultural IP and Brand Development in Chinese Animation: A Case Study of *Nezha*

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**Abstract:** *This study explores the role of cultural IP in the brand development of Chinese animation, using *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* as a case study. It aims to understand how cultural IP drives market expansion and enhances the global influence of Chinese animation, offering insights for brand management, media communication, and digital platform strategies. The research objectives are to (1) analyze the role of cultural IP in shaping animation brand identity, (2) examine *Nezha's* marketing and licensing strategies, and (3) assess its market performance and impact on brand development. A qualitative approach is employed, incorporating case analysis, industry reports, and in-depth interviews with 30 industry professionals and audience members. Participants include experts in marketing, content distribution, and audience engagement, providing diverse perspectives. Findings reveal that *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* successfully built a strong cultural IP through innovative storytelling, digital marketing, and cross-media integration. The film leveraged cultural narratives and audience engagement to enhance brand value while utilizing social media to amplify its reach and drive market growth. Results indicate that cultural IP not only strengthens the commercial viability of Chinese animation but also facilitates cross-cultural communication.*

## 1. Introduction

In recent years, the global animation industry has witnessed significant growth, with Chinese animation emerging as a key player in the market (China Art Research Institute Film Department, 2024). One of the most successful examples of this phenomenon is *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*, which not only achieved remarkable box office success but also demonstrated the potential of cultural intellectual property (IP) in brand development. Cultural IP plays a crucial role in expanding market influence, strengthening brand identity, and fostering audience engagement, making it an essential element in the global dissemination of Chinese animation. The rapid advancement of digital platforms and social media has further accelerated the development of cultural IP in animation (DarulIkhsan & Norsimaa, 2023). Unlike traditional branding approaches, cultural IP leverages storytelling, mythology, and cultural heritage to establish a deeper connection with audiences (Luo & Zeng, 2024). By integrating cultural narratives into its branding strategy, *Nezha* has successfully built a strong brand presence both domestically and internationally (Qin & Yu, 2020). This case exemplifies how cultural IP can enhance the commercial and cultural value of animated films, making them

more competitive in the global market. This study aims to explore the role of cultural IP in the brand development of Chinese animation, focusing on *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*. Specifically, the research seeks to analyze how cultural IP contributes to brand identity, examine *Nezha*'s marketing and licensing strategies, and assess its market performance and impact. Through a qualitative approach that includes case analysis, industry reports, and in-depth interviews with industry professionals and audience members, this study provides insights into how Chinese animation can leverage cultural IP for long-term brand sustainability and international success. The findings of this research are expected to contribute to discussions on media communication, brand management, and the role of cultural narratives in animation. By understanding the dynamics of cultural IP in Chinese animation, this study aims to offer practical recommendations for industry stakeholders seeking to enhance the global influence and commercial viability of Chinese animated films.

## 2. Literature Review

In recent years, cultural intellectual property (IP) has garnered widespread attention in the global media and entertainment industries, particularly in the animation sector (Ren, 2024). Cultural IP refers to the unique cultural elements, narratives, symbols, and traditions integrated into a brand, which can be effectively leveraged for commercial success (Wu & Yezhova, 2023). In the context of Chinese animation, cultural IP plays a crucial role in shaping brand identity, expanding market influence, and fostering audience engagement, becoming a key element in the global dissemination of Chinese animation (Peng, 2023). This section reviews existing literature on cultural IP and its impact on brand development, with a particular focus on the animation industry.

### 2.1 The Role of Cultural IP in Brand Building and Market Development

The intersection of cultural IP and brand building has been widely studied across various industries, especially in the context of a globalized media market. Previous research has emphasized the role of cultural IP in shaping brand identity, enhancing commercial appeal, and establishing cultural resonance (Zheng et al., 2024). For instance, Ait Bensalah and Yadav (2023) explored the role of cultural narratives in animation brand development, suggesting that cultural IP not only allows a brand to stand out but also facilitates its entry into international markets. Keidl (2021–2022) pointed out that cultural narratives strengthen the emotional connection between the brand and its audience, which is a key factor in the success of media franchises. In the context of Chinese animation, cultural IP is often viewed as a tool for global positioning, with animated films acting as ambassadors of Chinese culture (Tang, 2021). However, the specific ways in which cultural IP contributes to the formation of a unique animation brand identity, especially in films like *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*, and the commercialization strategies adopted, have not been extensively explored.

### 2.2 Marketing and Licensing Strategies in Animation

The commercialization of cultural IP through marketing and licensing strategies is another area that has received significant attention (Xu, 2023; Yang, 2024). Animation studios and content creators increasingly rely on these strategies to build sustainable brands, maximize revenue streams, and expand global influence (Zhu, 2024). The licensing of characters, storylines, and other cultural assets plays an important role in ensuring long-term brand success and recognition (Peng, Bijmolt, Völckner, & Zhao, 2023). Additionally, marketing strategies such as digital marketing, social media engagement, and cross-platform promotion have become core elements of animation brand development (Sahai, Joshi, & Sinha, 2023). Yan, Jiang, Wang, and Wen (2024) explored how animated films engage with audiences, build

communities, and promote merchandise through online platforms and social media. However, despite the rich literature on animation marketing, specific case studies on how *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* utilized marketing and licensing strategies to enhance its brand image and global influence are still limited.

### 2.3 Market Performance and Brand Impact

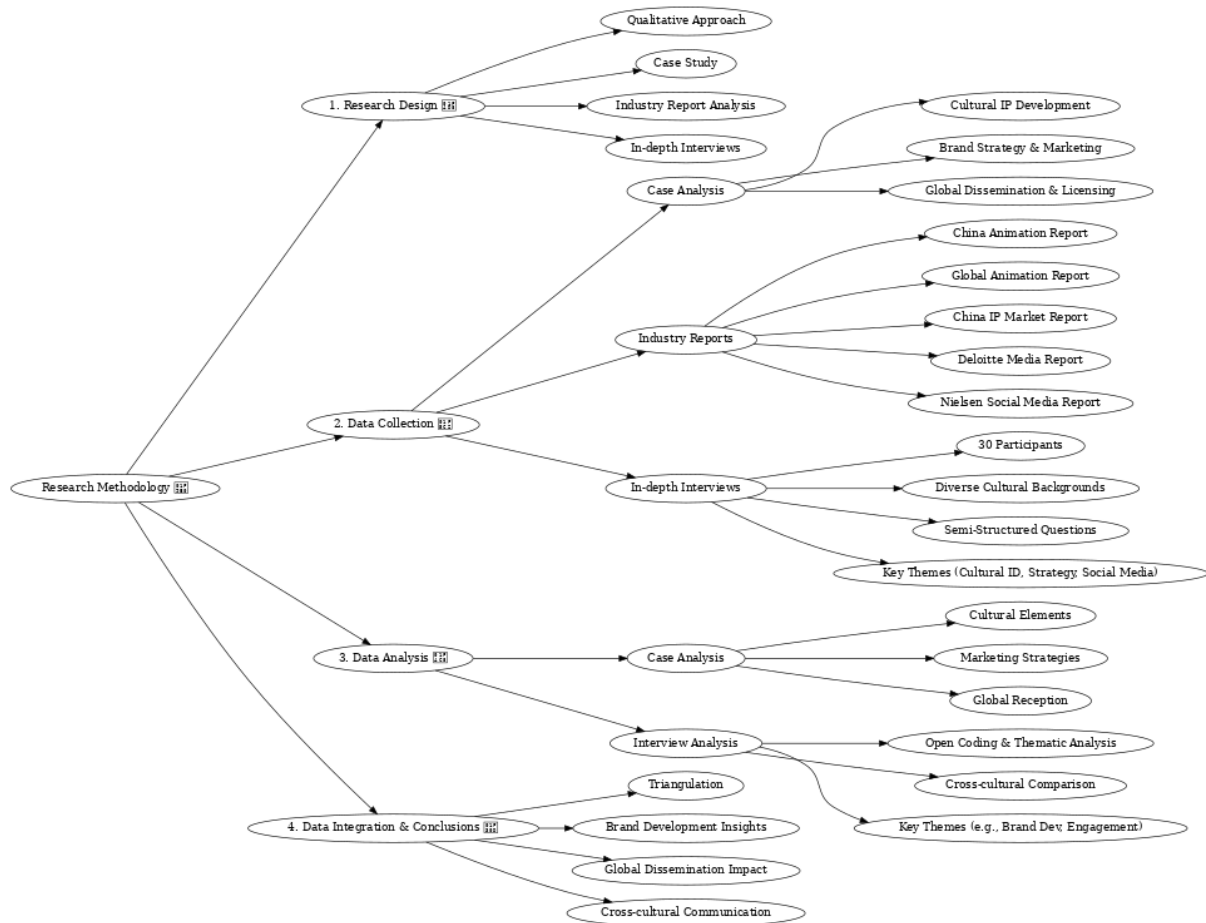
The relationship between market performance and brand development has been studied from various perspectives, including box office performance, merchandise sales, and digital platform performance (Muñoz Leiva, Rodríguez López, & Liébana Cabanillas, 2020). Previous studies indicate that market performance is often a reflection of the effectiveness of brand strategies and the strength of cultural IP (Huang & Bunchapattanasakda, 2023). However, these studies often overlook the cultural factors that influence market outcomes, particularly in the context of Chinese animation. *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* has been praised for its excellent box office performance and its ability to resonate with both domestic and international audiences, yet research on how its cultural IP influences market performance remains scarce (Lu, 2022). Furthermore, studies on how *Nezha's* market performance has driven its long-term brand development are also limited.

In summary, while there is abundant literature on cultural IP, animation brands, and marketing strategies, there is still a lack of research on the specific role of cultural IP in shaping Chinese animation brand identity, especially regarding how it functions within the commercialization strategies of films like *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*. Additionally, there is a gap in research regarding how specific films, such as *Nezha*, utilize marketing and licensing strategies to enhance brand image and the long-term impact of market performance on brand development. Therefore, the goals of this study are: (1) to analyze the role of cultural IP in shaping animation brand identity, (2) to examine *Nezha's* marketing and licensing strategies, and (3) to assess its market performance and impact on brand development. By achieving these objectives, this study will contribute new perspectives to the research on cultural IP in animation and provide valuable empirical evidence for the global expansion of Chinese animation.

## 3. Methodology

### 3.1 Research Design

This study adopts a qualitative research approach to comprehensively explore the pivotal role of cultural intellectual property (IP) in shaping and enhancing brand identity within the context of contemporary media. Focusing specifically on the case of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*, the research investigates the film's marketing strategies, licensing operations, and overall brand positioning to assess its performance in both domestic and international markets. The research design integrates multiple qualitative methods, including detailed case analysis, evaluation of relevant industry reports, and in-depth interviews with industry professionals as well as global audiences. By combining these diverse perspectives, the study aims to present a holistic and nuanced understanding of how cultural, commercial, and strategic elements intersect to drive the success and global resonance of *Nezha* as a cultural IP. The overall research framework guiding this study is visually represented in Figure 1.

### 3.2 Data Collection

**Case Analysis:** The study will first conduct a case analysis of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*. This analysis will focus on the construction of the film’s cultural IP, the implementation of its brand strategy, and its marketing approach. Specifically, the analysis will investigate the film’s distribution strategies in both domestic and international markets, the integration of cultural elements, and the expansion of brand partnerships and licensing. Industry reports, market data, and relevant media coverage will be reviewed to comprehensively evaluate how *Nezha* has achieved global dissemination through cultural IP.

**Industry Report Analysis:** Additionally, the study will reference existing industry reports on the Chinese animation sector, including those analyzing global animation market trends and the commercialization of cultural IP. Specific industry reports consulted include:

**China Animation Industry Annual Report (2019-2024)** -This report provides insights into the development and trends of the Chinese animation industry, highlighting key growth areas, challenges, and opportunities for Chinese animated films in the global market.

**Global Animation Market Report by Statista (2024)** – This report offers an analysis of global animation market trends, detailing the financial performance of animated films worldwide, with a focus on box office data, audience demographics, and the growth of animation in various regions.

China's Cultural IP Market Report (2024) – This report examines the commercialization of Chinese cultural intellectual property, including case studies on successful cultural IPs, market strategies, and the impact of cultural content on global brand expansion.

Deloitte's Global Media and Entertainment Report (2024) – This report covers trends in global media and entertainment, including the role of animated content and cultural IP in shaping international market strategies. It provides data on licensing, merchandise sales, and the global success of culturally significant films.

Social Media & Entertainment Consumption Report by Nielsen (2024) – This report looks at global social media trends and how entertainment brands, including animated films, have leveraged these platforms for audience engagement, marketing, and brand development.

By analyzing these reports, the study will gain contextual background on the overall development of the animation industry, the commercialization of brands, and successful cultural IP cases. Special attention will be given to *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* in terms of box office performance, brand licensing, merchandise, and social media presence. This data will offer deeper insights into the market influence of the brand.

**In-depth Interviews:** The study will also gather primary data through in-depth interviews with industry professionals and audiences. A purposive sampling method will be used to select 30 participants, including industry experts, marketing professionals, animation creators, and global audiences who have engaged with *Nezha*. The participants will represent a range of cultural backgrounds and language proficiencies to ensure diversity and representativeness in the data. Semi-structured interviews will be conducted, covering the following topics:

**Role of Cultural IP in Brand Creation:** Participants will be asked how cultural IP has helped shape the brand identity of *Nezha* and how cultural elements have been integrated into the brand strategy.

**Marketing and Licensing Strategies:** Interviewees will share their views on *Nezha*'s marketing strategies, particularly how the brand has expanded its market influence through social media, film merchandise, and cross-platform promotions.

**Market Performance and Brand Impact:** The interviews will explore *Nezha*'s global box office performance, audience reactions, and the long-term trajectory of the brand. Key factors that have contributed to its success will be highlighted.

### 3.3 Data Analysis

**Case Analysis:** Through the case analysis, the study will closely examine the marketing strategies, brand communication methods, and application of cultural IP in *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*. The research will begin by analyzing the cultural elements embedded in the film, exploring how these elements have been successfully integrated into brand development. Using industry reports, the study will assess *Nezha*'s reception in domestic and international markets. Particular attention will be paid to how the brand has gained recognition globally, including through international box office sales, brand licensing, and merchandise sales.

**Interview Data Analysis:** Interview data will be transcribed verbatim and analyzed using open coding and thematic analysis. The primary coding will focus on the following themes: cultural identification, brand development, marketing strategies, audience engagement, social media influence, and the cross-cultural transmission of cultural IP. Each interview segment will be

annotated to align with the research questions. Initial codes will be categorized into higher-level themes, such as "cultural elements and brand development," "global marketing strategies," and "impact of market performance on brand growth." The study will also compare perspectives from participants with different cultural backgrounds to examine any similarities and differences.

Using cultural dissemination theory, the study will interpret the interview data about the representation of cultural acceptance and dissemination patterns. The findings from the interview analysis will be compared with the case analysis and industry report data to identify consistent or complementary evidence. Triangulation will be employed to enhance the reliability and comprehensiveness of the study's conclusions.

### 3.4 Data Integration and Conclusions

By integrating the findings from the case analysis, industry reports, and interview data, this study will offer a comprehensive understanding of the role of cultural IP in brand creation, marketing, and licensing strategies, and their impact on market performance and brand development. The research will reveal how cultural IP has facilitated the creation of a global brand for *Nezha*, focusing on innovative marketing strategies, global brand expansion, and cross-cultural communication. These insights will contribute to a better understanding of how other Chinese animated brands can leverage cultural IP for international outreach and success.

## 4. Findings

Through the comprehensive analysis of interview data, industry reports, and case studies, we can see that *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* not only established an emotional connection with global audiences through deep cultural integration but also achieved global brand dissemination through precise marketing and cross-platform brand expansion. Tables 1, 2, and 3 provide key data and insights for our analysis, offering further evidence that supports the conclusion of this study regarding the critical role of cultural IP in brand creation and its global dissemination. The following sections outline the main findings derived from these analyses:

#### 4.1 Cultural Integration and Brand Identity

Through case analysis, we observe how *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* integrates traditional Chinese culture (such as mythology and Daoist philosophy) with modern pop culture to successfully create a globally recognizable brand identity. The film's core theme of "defying fate," combined with traditional cultural elements, not only gives the film a strong cultural signature but also resonates emotionally with global audiences.

Additionally, industry report analysis provides insights into how *Nezha* used these cultural elements to construct a unique brand image in both domestic and international markets. The report shows that the success of cultural IP depends not only on the depth of the content itself but also on its adaptability and appeal in different cultural environments. One of the key factors in the success of *Nezha* as a brand is its strong cultural identification, achieved through the storyline and character design.

Moreover, in-depth interviews reveal that industry professionals generally believe that the core of *Nezha's* success lies in its cultural inclusivity and adaptability to cross-cultural audiences. Participants in the interviews indicated that the film's ability to emotionally connect with global

audiences is due not only to its universal themes but also to the cultural symbols and messages that resonate globally.

#### 4.2 Effective Marketing and Licensing Strategies

Through case analysis, we examine how *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* successfully used precise marketing strategies and effective licensing collaborations to drive global brand dissemination. The film utilized strong social media marketing, online advertisements, and multi-platform joint promotions, using methods such as teaser trailers, interactive content marketing on social platforms, and promotional events to attract global audience attention.

Industry report analysis highlights that the film's licensing collaborations played a crucial role in its brand expansion. The report states that *Nezha* strengthened its market influence by partnering with products and industries like games and toys, boosting brand awareness and generating significant commercial returns through these licensing strategies.

In-depth interviews further show that marketing teams and brand managers widely believe that through targeted and effective promotional strategies, the film managed to reach audiences across different cultural backgrounds, thereby expanding the brand's influence. Marketing experts in the interviews stressed the importance of social media platforms, which provided flexibility and interactivity for the film's global spread.

#### 4.3 Audience Engagement and Social Media Influence

Through social media analysis and case analysis, the study reveals that *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* successfully used social media platforms (such as Weibo, Douyin, and Twitter) to encourage audience engagement and content creation. The film sparked widespread discussion on domestic social platforms and, through social media globally, enabled high levels of audience participation and interaction.

In-depth interviews with viewers further validate this finding. Many participants mentioned that through comments, shares, and secondary creations (such as fan art and parody videos) on social media platforms, they deepened their understanding of the film's cultural significance and engaged with other viewers worldwide. User-generated content (UGC) significantly amplified the film's cultural impact, turning it into a global cultural phenomenon.

Furthermore, industry report analysis confirms that social media plays an indispensable role in film marketing and brand dissemination. The discussions and content created on social platforms helped the film break through language and cultural barriers, allowing for cross-cultural communication and global spread.

#### 4.4 Cross-Cultural Reception and Brand Development

Through case analysis, we find that *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* successfully overcame challenges of cross-cultural communication, blending traditional Chinese cultural elements with the preferences of global audiences. The film's cultural symbols and storyline not only met the cultural identification needs of Chinese audiences but also received positive feedback from overseas viewers. Themes like "defying fate" and character development resonated across different cultures.

Industry report analysis further supports this. The report notes that in the internationalization of Chinese cinema, the adaptability of cultural IP is critical. *Nezha* is one of the successful

examples of such cultural IP, with positive reception in regions like Southeast Asia and North America, signifying the global brand development of the film.

In-depth interviews with experts indicate that the film's success lies not only in its ability to attract global audiences but also in its capacity to integrate different cultural backgrounds. Through targeted cultural exchange and education, *Nezha* helped global audiences better understand Chinese culture while also promoting cross-cultural brand recognition.

#### **4.5 Market Performance and Long-Term Brand Impact**

Through case analysis, we observe that *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* exceeded expectations in market performance. The film achieved historic box office success in China and performed well in overseas markets, especially in regions like Asia and certain parts of Europe, and North America, demonstrating its strong brand influence.

Industry report analysis shows that the film and its related merchandise performed excellently in global markets, becoming a model example of Chinese cultural IP. As the Chinese film industry continues to grow, the commercialization potential of cultural IP is becoming increasingly recognized, and *Nezha* provides valuable insights for future Chinese animated films in terms of brand development.

In-depth interviews with industry professionals further reinforce this. Experts widely agree that *Nezha* has not only achieved short-term commercial success but also established long-term brand influence through diversified licensing and cross-industry collaborations. Interviewed marketing professionals noted that the film's expansion into multiple fields has successfully transformed it from a single film into a global cultural brand.

### **5. Discussion**

In this section, we will delve into the brand-building process of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* as a cultural IP and its dissemination effect in the global market. By synthesizing case analyses, industry reports, and interview data, this study reveals the significant role that cultural IP plays in the development of animation brands in China, explores how marketing and licensing strategies drive commercial success, and assesses the long-term impact of the brand's market performance on the animation industry. This section will discuss several core issues: the influence of cultural IP on brand-building, innovative marketing and licensing practices, the role of social media in brand communication, and how cultural identity promotes audience acceptance.

#### **5.1 The Role of Cultural IP in Brand Building**

The success of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* is not only reflected in its box office performance but also in how it successfully built a brand identity through its unique construction of cultural IP. Cultural IP is at the heart of brand value, and by combining traditional culture with modern storylines, it created a brand image with deep cultural significance. In the film, the modernized portrayal of the classic character *Nezha*, along with the inclusion of traditional Chinese cultural elements, not only resonated with domestic audiences but also successfully broke cultural barriers, expanding its recognition in international markets.

The cultural IP operation strategy in *Nezha* was highly successful. First, the storyline and character design closely integrated classic elements of Chinese traditional culture (such as

Taoist philosophy and mythological figures), which naturally attracted global audiences. Secondly, the film infused traditional stories with new life by adopting unique animation styles and modern narrative techniques, making it accessible across cultural boundaries and winning the admiration of a broader audience. In this way, *Nezha* successfully built a brand image that is rich in cultural depth, visually impactful, and emotionally resonant.

## 5.2 Innovative Marketing and Licensing Practices

The marketing and licensing strategies of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* were undoubtedly one of the key factors in its success. The film not only made breakthroughs in traditional cinema markets but also expanded its brand influence through cross-media integration, digital marketing, and the use of social media platforms. Particularly in the Chinese domestic market, the film leveraged online platforms' promotional advantages, combining internet marketing with user-generated content (UGC) strategies to achieve rapid word-of-mouth spread. Through precise target marketing and innovative interactive methods, the film sparked audience engagement and social sharing, further driving the brand's globalization.

Additionally, licensing strategies were an important part of *Nezha*'s success. Through various forms of brand licensing (such as toys, merchandise, and film derivative works), the brand's market position was further solidified. These derivative products not only extended the film's influence but also generated significant economic benefits. It is worth noting that *Nezha*'s success in brand licensing is not just reflected in the diversity of products but also in the cultural and emotional extension of the brand. This made the brand more than just a commercial symbol—it became a medium for cultural exchange and identity.

## 5.3 The Role of Social Media in Brand Communication

Social media played a crucial role in the brand communication of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child*. Through social platforms, the film established a strong emotional connection with its audience, which helped propel the brand's widespread dissemination. The biggest advantage of social media is its efficient communication capability and its vast audience base. The film used platforms like Weibo and WeChat to promote and bring the cultural IP to the forefront, increasing the brand's visibility. Simultaneously, through social media, audiences not only passively received content but also actively engaged in discussions and brand propagation, even generating user-created content, which greatly enhanced the brand's loyalty and influence.

Social media also provided a real-time feedback channel, enabling the film's creators to adjust market strategies and content creation based on audience comments and discussions. This interactivity not only enhanced audience participation but also facilitated a positive feedback loop between the brand and its audience, reinforcing *Nezha*'s cultural identity and brand influence worldwide.

## 5.4 The Promotion of Audience Acceptance through Cultural Identity

In the context of globalization, cultural identity is crucial for the international dissemination of animated films. *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* was able to break through cultural and language barriers in part due to its precise grasp of cultural identity. By reinterpreting traditional cultural elements and combining them with modern aesthetics and emotional appeals, the film created a cross-cultural emotional connection that resonated with audiences from diverse cultural backgrounds. Interview data revealed that many overseas viewers gained a new understanding and appreciation of Chinese traditional culture through the film, even developing a sense of cultural identification.

This point is reflected in audience emotional feedback. Through culturally relevant storylines and characters, viewers not only received entertainment but also deepened their understanding and identification with Chinese culture through the film's profound cultural connotations. This establishment of cultural identity is both the core driver of the film's cross-cultural dissemination and a key factor in *Nezha*'s international success.

### 5.5 Implications for the Chinese Animation Industry

The success of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* provides valuable insights for the development of the Chinese animation industry. First, building cultural IP can not only enhance the commercial appeal of a brand but also bring it widespread cultural influence. By delving into traditional Chinese cultural elements and combining them with modern creative methods, animators can create culturally significant IPs that appeal globally. Second, innovative marketing and licensing strategies are crucial to a brand's success. *Nezha*'s success demonstrates the importance of cross-media integration and social media interaction. Especially leveraging digital platforms and social media enables brands to build deeper interactive relationships with audiences. Lastly, cultural identity is key for Chinese animation to reach international markets. By creating a brand image with cultural depth and emotional resonance, animation creators can break through language and cultural barriers to gain global acceptance.

## 6. Conclusion & Recommendations

### 6.1 Conclusion

This study examined the role of cultural IP in the brand-building process of *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* and its global dissemination through innovative marketing strategies, licensing, and social media communication. The research reveals that the film's success is deeply rooted in its ability to integrate traditional Chinese cultural elements with modern storytelling and animation techniques, creating a brand that resonates both locally and globally. By leveraging social media platforms and online communities, *Nezha* has successfully reached a diverse international audience, allowing it to break down cultural barriers and establish a lasting global presence for Chinese animation.

Cultural IP has proven to be a crucial factor in the commercial success and cultural significance of *Nezha*. Through its carefully crafted brand image and the emotional connections it formed with audiences, the film not only achieved commercial success but also played an important role in enhancing the global perception of Chinese culture. The film's marketing and licensing strategies, along with its social media engagement, provided the necessary tools for disseminating the film globally, ensuring that its cultural messages reached audiences across different regions and cultural backgrounds.

Overall, *Nezha: Birth of the Demon Child* serves as a prime example of how Chinese animation can thrive in the global market when cultural identity is combined with innovative marketing and strategic brand-building.

### 6.2 Recommendations

Based on the findings of this study, several recommendations can be made for the future development of Chinese animation and its global dissemination:

Licensing should also be expanded beyond traditional merchandise to include digital content, interactive experiences, and other cross-platform ventures that can further solidify the brand's position in the global market.

**Leveraging Social Media for Global Reach:** Social media platforms should be used more strategically to communicate with international audiences, promoting cross-cultural engagement and providing audiences with opportunities to actively participate in the brand's narrative.
